



Gravin's Worlds

Welcome to Gravin Melhuish's big, little worlds. Gravin is a curious three year old who has autism and lives in three worlds: world with mom, world with dad and world at school.

According to Statistics Canada, one in every 150 children is diagnosed with autism, and it affects boys four times more than it affects girls. Autism Speaks Canada defines autism as a complex neurobiological disorder that typically lasts throughout a person's lifetime. The disorder is characterized by varying degrees of impairment in communication skills and social abilities, and also by repetitive behaviours. Symptoms can range from mild to severe since autism is part of a group of disorders known as Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD). Gravin has been diagnosed as being on the spectrum and highly functional.

Gravin's father, Matt Melhuish, describes his son's symptoms by saying "he has issues communicating, speaking. He can think very well but it's getting those words out that's a problem."

Currently, the three-year-old attends a mainstream daycare where he has one teacher dedicated to him. The government of Canada helps the family by subsidizing Gravin's daycare, providing free transportation for the parents to and from daycare, as well as enrolling Gravin's mother, Kim Shaw, in a course about autism and effective teaching methods she can use with her son. This course also acts as a support group for parents with autistic

children. Although Melhuish would like to attend these classes, he cannot as he is the one who babysits Gravin so that Shaw can attend.

For Melhuish, this is both a blessing and a curse. He loves spending time with Gravin watching cartoons and playing Gravin's educational games. On the other hand, his own studies are affected.

"It's not always easy, especially because it's hard enough to do homework as it is," Melhuish says.

"Then I get a phone call and something's happened and he needs me. It's interruption after interruption, but I think it's gonna be worth it in the long run."

Melhuish hopes to gain full custody of his son in the near future. Currently, the father is enrolled in the electrical techniques program at Loyalist College. Melhuish's goal is to finish his studies by the end of this school year and get a steady job as an electrician. This will enable him to save money and, at the very least, rent an apartment for him and Gravin.

"I can't wait 'til I have my own place and I can just let him run free... 'cause he is a curious explorer," Melhuish says.

For Melhuish, his son's autism is not a big weakness.

"I just want him to grow up and be a good kid, and open up, and get over his... well, I don't even think it's that big of a debilitation. I mean, he is still an amazing boy."
