## *A touching goodbye*

Cpl. Vickers of Trenton salutes the convoy carrying the remains of Cpl. Nathan Cirillo as it passes under the Glen Miller Road overpass along the Highway of Heroes, enroute to his hometown of Hamilton, Ontario. Cpl. Cirillo was a reservist with the Hamilton-based Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. Cpl. Vickers was part of a large crowd there to honour Cirillo.

First- and second-year photojournalism students were asked to submit some of their favourite photos from this semester.

They told many stories with their cameras: from the tense moments in Ottawa in October during the shooting rampage which killed Cpl. Nathan Cirillo, to the touching

moment on Hwy. 401 when people gathered to say goodbye as the hearse headed to Hamilton.

They told stories during Remembrance Day as well as capturing the personalities of people from here, around the province and around the globe. There were visually ar-

resting photographs of wind turbines and lighting displays for Christmas. Sports such as hockey, soccer and karate rounded out the action.
